Wonder Women! The Untold Story of American Superheroines

WONDER WOMEN! THE UNTOLD STORY OF AMERICAN SUPERHEROINES is a 55-minute documentary that traces the fascinating evolution and legacy of Wonder Woman, as well as other female superheroes and icons of women's empowerment. From the birth of the comic book superheroine in the 1940s to the blockbusters of today, WONDER WOMEN! looks at how popular representations of powerful women often reflect society's anxieties about strong women.

WONDER WOMEN! goes behind the scenes with Lynda Carter, Lindsay Wagner, comic writers and artists, and real-life superheroines such as Gloria Steinem, Kathleen Hanna and others, who offer an enlightening and entertaining counterpoint to the male-dominated superhero genre.

The inspiration for the film came from a New York Times article that introduced Gail Simone (an Oregonian) as Wonder Woman's first female writer EVER. Here was this incredible feminist symbol who had always been stuck, like a lot of strong female characters, between being created by men and being primarily consumed by boys.

From Wonder Woman's original, radical World War II presence, to her uninspiring 1960s incarnation as a fashion boutique owner, to her dramatic resurrection by feminist Gloria Steinem and the women of Ms. Magazine, Wonder Woman's legacy continues today. Who knew that the depiction of Wonder Woman paralleled the pursuit of women's rights throughout the twentieth century?

Local Scholarship

First of all, I would like to thank Marian Dunlap for hosting our wonderful Holiday Luncheon. Our 2017/18 Local Scholarship recipient, Diem Olsen joined us and thoroughly enjoyed the luncheon and the fellowship with the members. She is so appreciative of our scholarship and noted how much help it was for her. Our monies pay for one quarter of her tuition. She said that she did get some additional grant money to help with the remaining two quarters, so she could borrow less money.

Diem shared a little of her journey to America. Her mother felt she would have more chances for education and a career in the United States, as it is very difficult for poor farmers to get education in Viet Nam. She came alone (she was sponsored), and spent the first two years going to school and learning English. Now she attends PCC full time, works part time in a dentist's office and has a 3.8 grade point average. She is studying to be a dental hygienist, and once she starts work, she is going back to school to become a dentist.

She hopes to serve the Viet Nam/Cambodia/Laos community in Portland. In addition, Diem is Vice President of the PCC chapter of Phi Theta Kappa Scholarship Honorary. She is quite an amazing and lovely young woman. She thanked us repeatedly for our financial help and for caring about her as a person. I, too, would like to thank you again for supporting our Local Scholarship. It truly makes a difference in the lives of the women we support.

Public Policy

VOTE "YES" for Healthcare on Referendum 101 in the January 2018 Special Election!

Oregon voters are being asked to approve a bill that was passed by the Oregon Legislature and signed into law by Governor Brown. The bill is temporarily valid until July, 2019. The measure asks voters to support the healthcare plan developed by healthcare experts and advocates throughout Oregon, businesses and unions, hospitals, the AARP and patient advocates. The plan guarantees that 95% of Oregonians maintain access to

healthcare and reduces premiums for those who buy their own coverage

The measure is an assessment on insurance companies, hospitals, and healthcare providers to ensure they are also paying into the system. The money from these assessments will provide funding for low-income individuals and families.

What is the "Big Deal"? It's a big deal because it is about healthcare that will cover all Oregonians, including those on Medicaid! There will be no reductions to healthcare coverage or benefits for the one million vulnerable Oregonians who count on Medicaid. Premiums for more than 210,000 Oregonians will stay at 6 percent lower than they would have been without the reinsurance program.

We are encouraged to vote in this special election and to vote yes.
