

The December program features a Zoom reading of the play, "The Hour Has Come", a story about the fight for women's right to vote and the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment. We will meet Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Sarah Grimke, Susan B. Anthony, and many others, who were leaders in the movement. We will also meet some men, who saw no reason that women would want, nor need, a say in government.

Linda Talluto is a member of our branch and a director with many years of experience. She retired as a teacher and director in the Tigard-Tualatin School District. In recent years she has directed many performances in local theater. Linda will be directing five actors, plus herself, to portray the various characters and hopefully bring these stories to life. They will be performing, via Zoom, live from their homes to your home.

# Resources and Support for Recent Immigrants January 13, 2021 7 pm via Zoom



Cynthia Kenyan, a volunteer at <u>Pamoja House</u>, is a retired PPS middle school science teacher. She has volunteered with Pamoja for 13 years, teaching ESL (English as a Second Language) Pre-Literacy Level. Cynthia will be sharing information about this organization that has been established to see immigrants in SW Portland becoming successful and contributing members of the community. Pamoja" is the Swahili word for "Together". The hope is that all people will "come together" to truly serve and care for one another through the Pamoja House.

This is a multicultural organization serving the diverse immigrant community in the SW Portland area through education, counseling, and vocational services. The organization specializes in ESL, driver's education, tutoring, and citizenship classes. With the high level of personal interaction, small class size, and caring volunteer staff, Pamoja House prides itself on its community building and support, through focusing on the personal needs of their individual students.

Cynthia got involved when she first met the director and her husband as a young couple moving into the neighborhood in SW Portland, where her church and school are located with lots of apartments around a new mosque just off Capital Highway. She shared their vision of reaching out to immigrants and refugees so they would be welcomed into the neighborhood, and it would not become a ghetto, like has happened with disastrous results in France. Cynthia said, "Now I see Hasna or Aisha walking on Capitol Highway. They are my friends, not unknown women

dressed in black or strange clothing. And, they are learning English and making friends with Americans and with fellow students from a variety of backgrounds."
