Second, we applaud the skills of our program and communication officers for delivering highly interesting and educational events virtually.



BOOK GROUP






Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson 3/23/2021 @ 7:00 pm Leader - Randa Blanding

AAUW BYLAWS CHANGE PROPOSAL

National AAUW is proposing a Bylaws change that would remove the membership requirement of a degree. Voting begins on April 7th.

Rationale: AAUWs mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW does not promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. The membership requirement is not fair, is not right, and is not equity. This is simply the right thing to do.
